West Suburban Delightful Delicacies

BEARD:

Susan Beard has spent more than four decades nurturing an incredible 3 acre garden that features tens of thousands of daffodils, tulips and other spring-flowering bulbs. Come summer, the winding paths through her woodland are packed with shade-loving ornamental plants and natives while glorious containers are carefully placed near paths and entry points. An experienced designer who once offered garden design services and gave talks at The Morton Arboretum, Beard planned her own garden to afford views with focal points from every room in the house. A gated arbor with an 8-foot opening was installed in the side yard to create an inviting entryway. She added a 19-foot-long bridge several years ago to make the garden's flow more interesting. A low semicircle of stone surrounds the seating area. "I tell people when you have rolling land, cut into it to make a wall, make it dramatic." And dramatic it is.

MORTON:

Situated on the rolling Valparaiso moraine and bisected by the East Branch of the DuPage River in the Chicago suburb of Lisle, The Morton Arboretum ranks among the leading arboreta of the world.

The Arboretum's tree breeding program has introduced disease-resistant trees including the AccoladeTM elm (*Ulmus davidiana var. japonica 'Morton'*), State StreetTM Miyabe's maple (*Acer miyabei 'Morton'*) and the Exclamation!TM London planetree (*Platanus acerifolia 'Morton Circle'*).

The Arboretum's free Plant Clinic helps homeowners, gardeners and landscape professionals throughout the Chicago region and the world grow healthy, attractive, well-chosen plants. Trained staff and volunteers are available in person, by phone, or by e-mail to help with tree and plant selection, identifying and coping with pests and diseases, and other concerns.

Conservation is a cornerstone of the Arboretum. The Arboretum's world-renowned 100-acre Schulenberg Prairie is one of the oldest reconstructed prairies in the U.S., while the Arboretum is leading and assisting efforts to prevent extinction and secure the world's threatened tree species through its Global Tree Conservation Program.

MCVAY - Walk into the west suburban garden of Pat and Rosalie McVay and the word that immediately springs to mind is "contemporary." Yet the garden is also brimming with no end of traditional elements.

"Our goal is to live 'softly on the earth'," says Rosie McVay of the intent behind their beautiful surroundings that include a four-season waterfall and fountain designed and installed by Aquascape Construction.

There's the vegetable garden, a garden pavilion, a garden pool with a waterfall, an espaliered fruit tree fronted by plantings suggestive of a knot garden and, out front, a labyrinth.

The McVays' garden pavilion, perfect for al fresco dining, is topped with solar panels that provide all the electricity for the house. The garden pool, a 10- by 20-foot above-ground concrete box, sits atop a cistern from which water circulates year round, requiring no purchases from the city. Water enters the pool through three copper "faucets" and exits to the cistern through a "waterfall" that is the favorite hangout for a pair of mallards that return every year. At the gravel base where water flows underground, there's a small pool where bees come to drink, appearing as early in the year as April.

When the McVays bought their current house, their goals were not just to create a beautiful garden but a productive one that truly took nothing from the land. The basic design concept for the half-acre lot is two large rectangular gardens visible from the house, a fenced vegetable garden and a series of square beds with a direct view to the pool just behind.

"The whole idea has always been to make a garden that's practical but also aesthetic," notes Rosalie. This the McVays have done, and they will move forward, interpreting centuries-old concepts in ways that speak to our own time.
